EDMARK



* Widely regarded as the "one that works," the *Edmark Reading Program* has long helped students who need an alternative to phonics. Edmark is a sight word based reading program.

*The key to this success is the program's use of a carefully sequenced, highly repetitive word recognition method combined with errorless learning. This approach eliminates incorrect responses and helps students view themselves as readers.

* motivates students by breaking learning into steps.






Edmark

- **Level 1** - 150 sight words and endings s, ed, and ing.
- **Level 2** - 200 additional sight words


Students complete a Discrimination test to determine which lesson and level to begin.

Small Group Instruction



* Students begin recognizing and reading a new word in isolation and gradually read in phrases, sentences, and stories.

*Students practice their new words in a variety of reading activities to reinforce new learning to ensure automatic word recognition.

SIPPS



SIPPS - systematic instruction in phonological awareness, phonics, and sight words. The SIPPS program can be used for grades K-12.


- SIPPS is a research based systematic decoding program that assists struggling readers to develop accuracy needed for fluent independent reading.
 - SIPPS is a structured base approach that focuses on foundational skills.
 - SIPPS is driven by instructional routines during small group and whole group instruction.

SIPPS



There are three levels of SIPPS

- 
- 1) Beginning Level - simple alphabetic phase
 - 2) Extension Level - addresses spelling patterns
 - 3) Challenge Level - the most complex stage of decoding


*Each Level begins with an initial placement assessment to determine a start point. Throughout each level there are assessments to monitor progress towards mastery of foundational Skills.





SIPPS

- **Intensive Routines for multisensory instruction**

- Students use arm and hand motions as they read and spell words
 - Daily repetition of tracing and writing words
 - Kinesthetic tactile learning: tall, short, and naughty letters.
 - Teacher models to reinforce spelling, sounds, and sight words.
 - Students engage in teacher directed guided spelling as letters, words, and sentences are written.

SIPPS

Whole Group Instruction

- Allows students to respond orally during foundational skills routines.
- Students build foundational skills that gain confidence for independent reading

Small Group Instruction

- read controlled vocabulary text to practice words and skills taught
- Read books at appropriate level to build fluency and boost confidence.

Student Application provides targeted learning- Technology Component

- Six zones provide direct instruction, practice, and feedback on areas where students struggle most: spelling, writing, academic vocabulary, and comprehension.
- Individual paths guide students at their own pace, informed by their performance, engagement, and teacher input.
- Segment Selector allows students to tailor content to their personal interests, enhancing interaction as they choose from 25 unique topics.



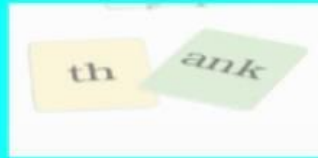
Small-Group Workshops drive systematic instruction.

- Interactive *Real Book* challenges students with increasingly complex texts and content-area vocabulary to foster language development.
- One writing task per Workshop helps students plan, organize, and write (POW) responses to text over several days.
- Sequenced texts help students read grade-level passages with support by the end of each Workshop.

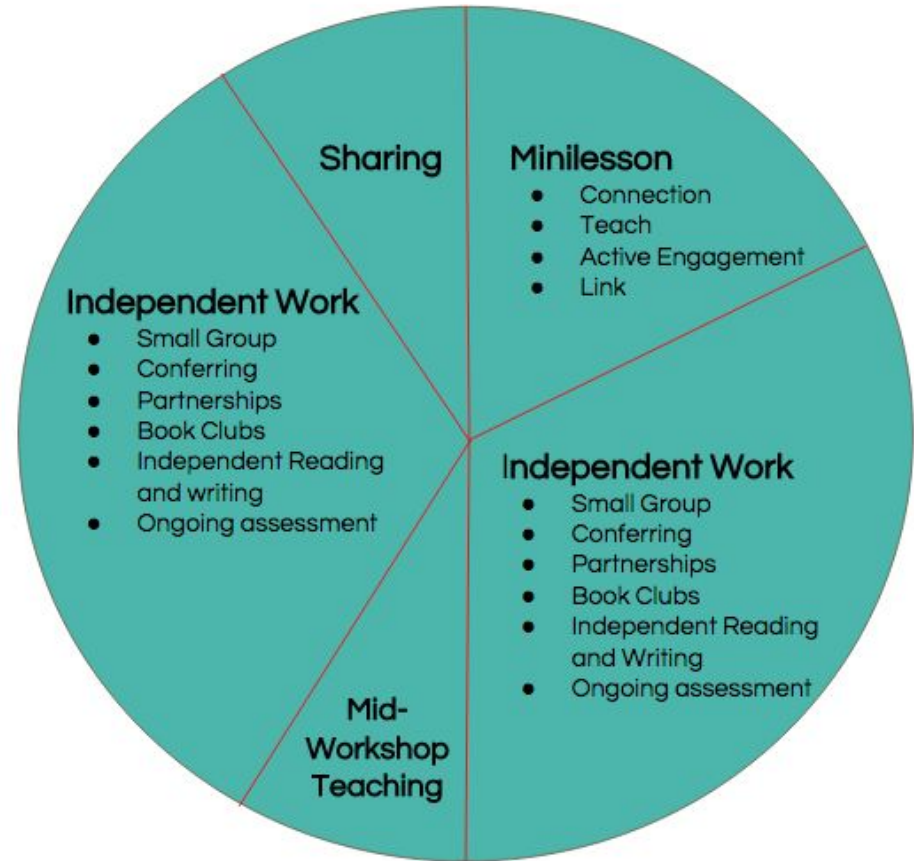
In-Class Resource (ICR)

In-Class Resource (ICR)

- Maximum of 10 special education students
- Integrated into a General Education setting
- Highly qualified subject area teacher and a special education teacher
- Students require moderate modifications and accommodations
- May struggle academically more than typical peers
- Learning disabilities, executive functioning skills
- Special education teacher will support students individually
- Differentiation based on academic weaknesses
- Small group instruction within the classroom by both teachers
- Goals and objectives can be a combination of Workplace Readiness/
Study skill and curriculum based goals

In-Class Resource (ICR) The Workshop Model

- Students may be doing different things within the work time.
- Teachers working with students
- Build student independence while scaffolding to support growth
- Expected routine runs smoothly
- Can be problem-based, planned through learning styles, or can address different areas of that specific curriculum



Modifications within ICR

- Utilize grade level materials while adhering to the curriculum
- Individualized modifications as per 504/IEP
- Multi-sensory presentation to accommodate various learning styles
- Writing is broken into manageable tasks (SCR-short constructed response)
- Background knowledge is presented prior to beginning reading
- Reading selections read in class as whole group with discussion
- Audio available for most selections
- Multimedia presentation of curriculum
- Grading is individualized to allow for growth and success
- Opportunity to make corrections and resubmit assignments
- Small group instruction
- Modify within class specific to individual needs

Wilson Reading System

- Teaches total word construction through direct, multi-sensory instruction
- Appropriate for students who have not internalized the sound and syllable system for reading and spelling
- Greatly benefits students with dyslexia or those that are unable to decode accurately
- Designed for students with low to high average IQ (not global developmental delays)
- 12 step intervention that can take from one to four years of instruction
- Grade level curriculum is integrated with modifications
- At middle school Wilson Reading is primary ELA class
- Whole group instruction, small group intervention, independent practice
- Demonstrate mastery of substep skills prior to advancing
