History of Cuts and Appeal

March 2018 - After many years of struggling with stagnant state aid, our district received a very slight increase in state aid for the 2018-2019 school year. Even with that very slight increase in state aid, the district was forced to eliminate approximately 12 positions. The district also had to scale down facilities improvements and, reject curriculum and technology initiatives in order to build a balanced budget.

July 2018 - The district received a revised state aid notice revealing that the district actually lost almost \$600,000 in state aid for the 2018-2019 school year. The district was forced to put the burden on the backs of the local taxpayers and applied for waivers and banked cap to increase property taxes by almost 5%.

August 2018 - The district submits a compelling appeal to the Commissioner of Education to restore the loss of state aid.

October 2018 - The Commissioner of Education denies the district's appeal.

October 2018 - The district joins other school districts in a lawsuit to block state aid cuts.

March 2019 - The district is notified that it will lose another \$623,156 in state aid for the 2019-2020 school year. The district was unable to increase property taxes by more than 2.0%. As a result, the district was forced to eliminate programs and staff.

August 2019 - The district submits yet another compelling appeal to the Commissioner of Education to restore the loss of state aid.

December 2019 - The Commissioner of Education denies the district's appeal.

January 2020 - The district asks the Commissioner of Education to reconsider his position - requesting a face-to-face meeting to discuss the issue.
